TIPS FOR WRITING A WSASAS PROCEEDINGS PAPER

Follow ALL instructions provided by *Translational Animal Science* (TAS) Style and Form, and the WSASAS Submission Guidelines.

When preparing your submission, always consider that your research may also be submitted for publication into a scientific journal. Therefore, WSASAS Proceedings should be different from subsequent journal manuscripts to avoid concerns with text duplication and originality. To prevent future publication issues:

- **WSASAS Proceedings** should be written in an objective manner to comply with length limitations, which help preventing text duplication between WSASAS Proceedings and journal manuscripts.
- **Introduction:** Be concise and avoid extensive literature review. Yet, ensure that there is adequate background information to support the hypothesis and research objective.
- **Materials and Methods:** Provide just enough information so readers can understand the research design. Consider citing the methods already published by others (when appropriate).
- **Results and Discussion:** Present your all research results objectively. Do not duplicate the same information among text, tables, and/or figures. Include a brief discussion, based on your hypothesis and pertinent literature, to help readers understand and appraise research outcomes. Again, stay away from comprehensive discussions—leave that for the journal manuscript!
- **Tables and Figures:** Be cautious with the amount of data reported. Focus on information relevant to methods and results pertinent to hypothesis/objectives. Also, consider submitting different Tables and Figures that those planned to be included in the complete journal manuscript.
- **Literature Cited:** Do not overcite in the text but ensure that adequate references are included to define methods and facilitate relevant discussions.
- **Remember:** WSASAS Proceedings are a great opportunity to disseminate your work and distinguish us from the other ASAS sections. However, write them in a manner that will not affect your ability to publish the complete journal manuscript in the future!
